- **This is a newly revised Calculator with more options for Calculation of Maintenance Guidelines and Child Support (see Laws of 2015, Ch. 269 and 387)
- *For use in computing:
 - 1) maintenance and child support combined where the maintenance award is the guideline amount,
 - 2) guideline maintenance only, or
 - 3) child support only where there is a different maintenance award or a zero maintenance award.

- *You must enter codes and dollar amounts where required for calculator to work properly.

*If the court finds the award amount to be unjust and inappropriate, the court can order the Maintenance Payor to pay an adjusted amount. Additionally, if the Maintenance Payor's income exceeds \$228,000, the court may award an additional amount. The determination of these adjusted and/or additional amounts are based on the court's consideration of 15 Factors for Post- Divorce Maintenance.		
20. Advisory Schedule for Duration of Award The court must determine how long the maintenance award will be paid using the 15 Factors for Post-Divorce Maintenance, and the court may also consider the Advisory Schedule for Duration of Award setting forth percentages of the length of the marriage for which maintenance may be payable.
